Lack of knowledge and information	<p>a) "I observe doctors who are not very concerned and who do not give much information about the disease. I think they could offer more help, for example, 'free samples' of the creams they prescribe." (Male caregiver, Spain)</p> <p>b) "I wish the physician explained more about the nature of the disease." (Male caregiver, Saudi Arabia)</p> <p>c) "I am worried about the future of the disease; nobody tells me anything." (Female caregiver, China)</p> <p>d) "The relationship is general, not too cold, not too close, and the GP didn't go into detail about the disease and its chronicity." (Female caregiver, China)</p>

Also, it's so difficult to communicate with her outside the clinic." (Female caregiver, Saudi Arabia)</p> <p>b) "I prefer to have an adequate time with the HCP; sometimes I feel like my daughter's case is not serious enough to grab the HCP's attention fully." Lack of support for changes throughout life stages	a) "Although the HCP usually answers my questions, I don't feel like he has been fully engaged with my daughter's case." (Male caregiver, Saudi Arabia)
